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

The prophetic books—such as Daniel and Revelation—give us a glimpse of it. Time will culminate in the unveiling of an eternal kingdom and its King—our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Many kings, rulers, and leaders have come and gone throughout history. The leaders we see on the world stage even now will not endure. They may make a lot of political noise and seem to loom large, but their power is as nothing in God's eyes (Psalm 62:9-12).

It won't be long until Jesus is revealed. He'll be seated on His throne, clothed in righteousness, and crowned with glory and honor—and this will *never* change. If we have put our trust in Him, we can look forward to a place in His kingdom, even as we serve Him today.

Scripture: Ruth 4:9-17

Song: "O God, Our Help in Ages Past"

The Right Match

[Samuel] asked Jesse, "Are these all the sons you have?" "There is still the youngest," Jesse answered. "He is tending the sheep" (1 Samuel 16:11).

Scripture: 1 Samuel 16:1-13 **Song:** "Change My Heart, O God"

When organ transplant teams search for a heart recipient, they don't look at hair or eye color, personal achievements, or IQ. When making their decision, they look at blood type, the size of the heart in comparison to each candidate, and other factors that truly matter for a successful transplant. Ultimately, they choose someone who will be the best possible match.

David didn't appear to be the right candidate to be anointed king. He wasn't the oldest, the strongest, or the best-looking of his brothers. But he was the one who understood what it meant to care attentively and faithfully for his father's sheep. God's choice of David as a future king was a surprise to everyone. But God could see what others could not: David had the heart of one who would serve and lead well, a heart that matched God's criteria.

No matter how we try, our own strivings or accomplishments don't qualify us for service in God's kingdom. Rather, as we submit our hearts to be shaped by Him, He prepares us for the work He has for us to do.

Nevertheless

The king and his men marched to Jerusalem to attack the Jebusites, who lived there. The Jebusites said to David, "You will not get in here." . . . Nevertheless, David captured the fortress of Zion—which is the City of David (2 Samuel 5:6-7).

Scripture: 2 Samuel 5:1-10

Song: "Just as I Am"

Sean Lewis was born with cerebral palsy and uses a wheelchair. Nevertheless, he has made it his mission to continue pressing toward his goals. With the support of family and friends, he participates in marathons, advocates for others with disabilities, and has become a motivational speaker. Through everything he does, he seeks to spread the message that God can and will use anyone who is willing to serve Him, no matter their circumstances.

David's story is also marked by "nevertheless" situations. He was the youngest brother; nevertheless, God chose him. Goliath threatened David's life; nevertheless, David defeated him. Saul hunted David to kill him; nevertheless, David escaped and later became king in Saul's place. The Jebusites mocked and ridiculed David; nevertheless, he captured their fortress. Over and over again, God enabled David to triumph in adversity.

Sometimes we may feel that our circumstances or deficits disqualify us from serving God. But when God chooses us for a task, He also gives us what we need to complete it. With God as our strength, our apparent weaknesses are only the beginning of our own "nevertheless" story.

His Enduring Word

"How will this be," Mary asked the angel, "since I am a virgin?" The angel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come on you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. . . . For no word from God will ever fail" (Luke 1:34-35, 37).

Scripture: Luke 1:26-38

Song: "Every Promise of Your Word"

The Rose of Hildesheim—a wild dog-rose bush that climbs the walls of Hildesheim Cathedral in Germany—is believed to be the oldest rose in the world. Known as the Thousand-Year Rose, it was destroyed when the cathedral was bombed during World War II. However, its roots survived, and after new growth pushed through the rubble, the remarkable rosebush bloomed once again.

The Word of the Lord that Gabriel brought to Mary seemed impossible. Certainly, Mary didn't understand how she could give birth to a son—let alone the Son of the Most High! Yet God's will was not hindered by anything Mary saw as an obstacle. The angel assured her that God's Word would never fail, and in response Mary's lips echoed the trust that was in her heart: "May your word to me be fulfilled" (Luke 1:38).

When God makes a promise, it will be fulfilled, even when we can't see how. His Word is rooted deeply in the truth of His character, and no damage, desecration, or destruction on earth will ever keep His enduring Word from springing up to its fulfillment.

A Refuge from Fear

Blessed are all who take refuge in him (Psalm 2:12).

Scripture: Psalm 2

Song: "Under His Wings"

My dog is afraid of candles, which means family birthdays are mildly traumatic experiences for him. He'll be sitting next to my chair wagging his tail, but as soon as the lighter flicks on, his ears flatten, and he retreats to a far corner until the candles are all blown out. Considering the tiny size of the flames, I can't help laughing a little at his sudden retreat. Of course, I go to comfort him afterward.

To our God, who is enthroned in Heaven, even the combined power of earth's nations is such an insignificant threat that He laughs at rulers' plans and efforts to overthrow Him, and He readily grants power to His Son, the King of kings, to break the nations into pieces. But to those who serve the Lord with an awed understanding of His power, He provides a place of safety and refuge in His presence.

Whether we feel frightened by the threats of leaders who disrespect God, or by wars, or by natural disasters, or by circumstances that feel out of control, or even by daily activities that feel scary to us, God offers us an alternative to our fear. When placed beside His power, the things we shrink from become small by comparison, and in Him we find a secure place of refuge and protection.

Father, thank You for reminding me of Your greatness today. I give You each of my fears and worries, and I choose to trust You as my safe refuge. In Jesus' name, amen.

Complete Transformation

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned (Isaiah 9:2).

Scripture: Isaiah 9:1-7

Song: "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel"

During a trip to Switzerland with my dad, we made a stop in the mountain town of Zermatt, hoping to enjoy views of the iconic Matterhorn Peak. Sadly, the day we visited was extremely cloudy. We took a cable car up the mountain and still could barely see anything. But the day we were scheduled to leave dawned bright and clear. The sunrise changed everything, chasing away any remaining clouds and highlighting the snowy peak with beautiful pinks and golds.

Isaiah 9 describes the coming of God's chosen One, whose arrival would change everything. The people would go from living in deep spiritual darkness to rejoicing in the light of His coming. With His appearance, the promised Son of God would bring justice, righteousness, and peace. Nothing would be as it had been.

Jesus changes everything. He brings hope, joy, and peace into our lives. In times of grief and loss, He is our wonderful counselor. As our everlasting Father, if we wander from Him, He draws us back to himself and to our spiritual family. Even the hardest and most challenging circumstances are different because of His promise to one day chase away every remaining cloud of darkness with the light of His everlasting presence (Revelation 21:1-4).

Called to Share

Through him we received grace and apostleship to call all the Gentiles to the obedience that comes from faith for his name's sake (Romans 1:5).

Scripture: Romans 1:1-7

Song: "Go Tell It on the Mountain"

I had a friend in college who loved introducing others to the things she loved, whether it was a favorite movie, television show, or book series. Her joy was evident whenever someone else became excited about something she had shared with them. By the time we all graduated, many of us had new favorite shows or books, thanks to her enthusiasm.

The apostle Paul had a strong sense of his own calling, and he considered it his life mission to introduce others to Jesus and to help them know their own calling as believers. In today's passage, Paul explains that believers are called to obedience that comes through faith, called to belong to Jesus, and called to be God's holy people. Additionally, as believers, we join in the mission to call others to Jesus through the gospel message.

The story of Jesus' transforming love at work in our lives is the best thing we can share with others. Even though it might feel uncomfortable or intimidating at times, bringing the gospel message to others is a call we are meant to obey (Matthew 28:18-20). Let's be ready this Christmas season to share the gospel message so others will hear God's call to come to Him.

A Greater Call

[God told Nathan to tell David,] "Your house and your kingdom will endure forever before me; your throne will be established forever" (2 Samuel 7:16).

Scripture: 2 Samuel 7:4-17 Song: "I Surrender All"

In 1876, young Lilias Trotter (1853–1928) met one of England's most well-known art critics, who told her he could take her raw talent and make her into one of England's greatest living artists. The pull to cultivate her artistic ability was strong, yet ultimately, she realized she couldn't dedicate herself to art and still seek God's kingdom first. A few years later, she felt called to mission work in Algeria and spent the rest of her life sharing the hope of Jesus with the people there.

David's desire to build a house for God was a sincere one, but it wasn't what God wanted. God only wanted David to continue doing what He originally anointed him to do—to shepherd His people as their king. In His goodness to David, God promised to establish a house for him—a posterity—that (in Christ) would ultimately rule forever. In a sense, what David had wanted to do for God—build a house for His name—God did for David.

Sometimes our good desires must be set aside for the sake of God's greater calling. As we seek God's kingdom first in our lives, He will lead us into His plans beyond our own pursuits and with effects that last far beyond our own lifetime.

Father, I want to pursue Your kingdom first, above and beyond my own desires. Help me to discern Your call and follow You faithfully. In Jesus' name, amen.

Speak Up!

I will sing of the LORD's great love forever; with my mouth I will make your faithfulness known through all generations (Psalm 89:1).

Scripture: Psalm 89:1-4, 27-37

Song: "I Will Sing of the Mercies of the Lord"

I once attended a worship event with some of North America's most popular Christian musicians. I laughed to myself when one of them said, "Don't worry if you can't sing; no one else will be able to hear except the person in front of you. Just sing anyway!"

The writer of Psalm 89 is full to overflowing with a song testifying to God's goodness. It's a reminder to us that our testimony is worth sharing even if it doesn't seem as dynamic as what God has done in someone else's life. Such comparisons put us at risk of being silenced from telling of God's goodness in our own lives. Let the truth be told: everyone has a testimony, and God can use each voice!

Every day we need to realize that there will be people in front of us who do not know God. Our response to a world that does not know Him is to raise our voices, to tell our stories. As we live our lives with thankful hearts, may many people come to know Jesus and begin sharing their own testimonies.

Don't Give Up

[Zechariah and Elizabeth] were childless because Elizabeth was not able to conceive, and they were both very old (Luke 1:7).

Scripture: Luke 1:5-17 **Song:** "Higher Ground"

Colonel Sanders (1890–1980) sold his first Kentucky Fried Chicken franchise in 1952, and so began his rise to fame and fortune in the fast-food industry. If you were to read his biography, however, you would learn of his interpersonal struggles, countless failed ventures, and dreams that never came to pass. Remarkably, he didn't lose hope over the years, and when his big break finally came, he was in his sixties.

In Bible times, having children was a sign of having obtained God's favor. Elizabeth, a descendant of Aaron's priestly line, had never been able to conceive. While others may have seen her as being outside of God's favor, God's plan was to bless her in her old age with a special son. From a human perspective, it looked as though her best years were behind her. Yet, in God's providence, she became the mother of John the Baptist, the forerunner who would prepare the way for the long-awaited Messiah.

God's grace manifests itself uniquely in each of our lives. The Lord's ways are not our ways, and His timing does not always line up with ours. However, that doesn't mean He is absent or overlooking us. He is always at work, moving things, lining them up, orchestrating them—working all things together for the good of those who love Him (Romans 8:28).

Father, give me the ability to persevere even when I can't see the blessing. In Jesus' name, amen.

No Doubt About It

[The angel Gabriel said to Zechariah,] "Now you will be silent and not able to speak until the day this happens, because you did not believe my words, which will come true at their appointed time" (Luke 1:20).

Scripture: Luke 1:18-23 **Song:** "Only Believe"

The effects of coffee beans are thought to have been discovered by an Ethiopian goat farmer. Apparently the farmer's goats ate the beans and became highly energetic afterward. Later, when people began grinding the beans and preparing them as a drink, there were some who doubted it could be beneficial and even said it was evil. Today, however, despite past skeptics and naysayers, coffee helps many of us get the day started, delivering on its promise to provide a boost of energy.

Through the angel Gabriel, God promised the elderly Zechariah the blessing of a son. But to Zechariah, this promise seemed suspect, even impossible. Regardless of what things looked like to Zechariah, however, God was able to deliver on His promise. As a consequence of his doubt, Zechariah was unable to speak until the promise came to fruition. Yet even in Zechariah's silence, the Lord was still present, working out His plan, fulfilling His promise.

The Bible says that all God's promises are "Yes" in Christ (2 Corinthians 1:20). When He calls for something to come to pass, even if it's in the distant future, we can trust fully in His good plan.

Father, when I'm tempted to doubt You, grant me renewed faith to trust that You'll fulfill each promise, just as You have always done. In Jesus' name, amen.

Made Strong in God's Presence

Blessed are those whose strength is in you, whose hearts are set on pilgrimage (Psalm 84:5).

Scripture: Psalm 84

Song: "You Are My All in All"

Recently the Lord began to bring to my mind people who are dealing with trials: threats of divorce, cancer, paralysis, and persistent anxiety to name a few. As I pondered how to respond to loved ones who are hurting, God seemed to lead me to Psalm 84.

Scripture records that at appointed times during the year, the Jewish people would make the trek to Jerusalem to worship at the temple. These travelers had trials and tragedies in their lives, just as we do. The writer of this psalm understood, though, that if God's people could just press on to God's house—to His temple—they would find peace in His presence. While some of them may have grown weak on the journey, they would soon become strong as they worshipped at the temple of their Holy God.

It's usually not helpful to tell someone who is hurting to find the strength to stand up and move on. But what I have come to understand is that the difference between a hurting person and a healing person is often found in a change of heart, a change of mind, and a change of perception regarding God's nearness. Thankfully, we do not have to make the journey to Jerusalem to experience the peace of God. We can call on Him at any time, and He will be with us, even in our pain.

Father, give me strength and hope when I'm struggling. In Jesus' name, amen.

The Way to Well-Being

[God said,] "You who revere my name, the sun of righteousness will rise with healing in its rays. And you will go out and frolic like well-fed calves" (Malachi 4:2).

Scripture: Malachi 4 **Song:** "Trust and Obey"

I recently read an article by a farmer who raises dairy cows to produce organic milk. Weather permitting, he allows them to graze in the open pasture, where they are free to roam as they wish. He found that when cows are given the ability to graze without being confined, they are happier and healthier overall, and healthy cows produce better milk.

While the Israelites were God's chosen people and God desired to grant them peace and freedom, they continued to stray from God's ways, stumbling along in their sin. God knew that a happier, more productive quality of life would only be possible when Israel would trust in Him completely for fulfillment. Malachi's plea was for the people of Israel to acknowledge and obey God and return to His paths of righteousness.

How we view God impacts how we respond to Him. Do we trust God's Word when it says that no weapon formed against us will prosper (Isaiah 54:17)? Do we believe that He has given us everything we need to thrive spiritually (Ephesians 6:10-17)? God has good plans for us, and they all start with trusting His goodness and obeying His Word.

Father, I yield my heart today to walk in Your life-giving ways. Thank You that as You lead me in paths of righteousness, I will thrive! In Jesus' name, amen.

Our Good God

[Elizabeth's] neighbors and relatives heard that the Lord had shown her great mercy, and they shared her joy (Luke 1:58).

Scripture: Luke 1:57-66

Song: "Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty!"

My wife and I desire to make God the center of our marriage. Recently the Lord seems to be bringing us into new territory as we've been coming alongside married couples who are struggling. One of these people commented about how different my wife and I are from many others our age—that we somehow have the capacity not to just manage our marriage but also to make time to serve God. This observation opened the doorway to sharing our testimony and rejoicing over all that God has done in our lives.

God's mercy, not our striving, is at the center of everything He gives us. For Zechariah and Elizabeth, what once seemed impossible was now a reality. Walking with God has shown me that I am only the vessel into which He pours His mercy. As a Christian, I can boldly share my testimony to invite and encourage others to seek God in their own lives and to discover what He can do for, in, and through them.

Scripture: Luke 1:67-80 **Song:** "To God Be the Glory"


